





A LOOK BACK MUSINGS FROM THE BIG TWO FIVE

On a quiet Saturday or Sunday, at Station 25, the radio suddenly announced a full response in Lake City. Shortly thereafter an excited voice from E39 described a working fire in a string of businesses. It sounded serious. The Captain of L10 got on the station loudspeaker for L10 to suit up as they were going north. Even before they were called, they were out the door for the north end. They must have been to the freeway before the bells hit for them to move up. I figured they were going to see some action but not much of a chance for E25 as we did not get moved up to the north end as often as L10 did. The fire quickly went to a 2nd alarm and just like that the bell hit for engine 25 for a move up to 39's. Surprise, surprise maybe we could see some fire duty. When we got to the ship canal bridge, we could see a large column of black some in the far distance. Sometime before we arrived at 39's the fire went to a 3rd alarm and we were on the response. Before were arrived, the Chief gave us instructions to lay a Monitor Manifold on the south side of the fully involved

building. I sent the engine to the east for the nearest hydrant while a fireman, that we nicknamed the grasshopper, and I aimed the monitor into the fire and started lobbing thousands of gallons of water on to the fire. After about an hour I noticed an assistant or deputy chief watching the fire on the south end of the building. I told the grasshopper to watch things as I wanted to talk to the Chief. I had noticed a door located at the center of the south wall. I figured if we opened the door and aimed the monitor into the doorway maybe we could make some progress on the fire. I ask him what do you think if we forced that door and aimed the monitor into to it? He didn't answer but must have been thinking about it. Suddenly a huge section of roofing or siding came crashing down and smashed into the sidewalk right at the foot of the door where we were going to be working.- and I mean it crashed down. I looked at the Chief and said, "you know if we had done that the grasshopper would have been squished like a bug." The Chief looked at me and without a word walked away. I learned an important lesson that day and it was that I knew why he was a Chief and I was a lowly Lieutenant.

One day E25 and a whole bunch of others were assigned on a full response to a reported apartment fire on Boren Ave. We had turned north on Boren when the dispatcher said "all units responding to xxxx Boren Ave code green except for E25 and M1. I had to admit I had never heard that before. As we got to the apartment unit we could smell smoke and when we got into the dimly lit room there was an older gentlemen sitting in a chair with his pants half down and a circle of porno magazines at his feet. He had tried to light up a cigarette and had set his greasy hair on fire. The poor devil looked like Wiley coyote with his smoldering hair burned to frizzy clumps. Amazing as it was, he had suffered only minor burns. M1 quickly had him off under their care to HMC. It was runs like this, as a reason that, firemen love their jobs for each day you knew you were going to see something different.
